Also called "Doc" by the animators, is an award winning writer who started writing for the stage at age 14, and published his first comedy skit at age 18. Doc received his Bachelor of Arts degree in Telecommunications (Radio-Television-Film) from Texas Tech University. A native of Louisiana, while in college he worked for the public television station as the evening air director and went on to work at Tarrant County Junior College in the Audio-visual department where he supervised staff in AV services. He also worked at the Texas College of Osteopathic Medicine where he wrote and produced visual media presentations as part of his job. He won first place in the Writer's Digest Scriptwriting Competition, and Best Screenplay set in Texas for the Lone Star Screenplay Competition. His published plays, including "The Love Sick Computer" have been produced internationally. Also, he worked with puppetry and drama teams who performed his scripts around the world. He wrote and directed an original dramatic presentation for the Baptist Student Union conference where two thousand people were present. He has published articles on using Multi-Media in Musicals and on the use of puppetry. He has also written multiple articles for teen magazines. In addition, some of his sketches have appeared in various published collections.

Besides being an author and collaborator, Doc is a board certified Osteopathic Physician in Family Medicine and Neuromusculoskeletal Medicine. He has authored two medical texts, and multiple articles. He received the Louisa Burns Research Award in 2007, and currently serves as the Residency Director for the Florida Hospital East Orlando Family Medicine/Neuromusculoskeletal Medicine.
